traces of the past everywhere - if you know where to look. Like long forgotten bush cemeteries, home to the earliest European settlers. Or the grand old buildings, constructed during the gold rush, that pepper the streets of our small towns.

Spend an afternoon at the berry farm, local brewery or stop in at the local museum. Make time for the sounds of the river to soothe and refresh from your own picnic point.

But above all, relax. Stay awhile.
There are many hotels, retreats,














66 We were from Melbourne, but both bushies at heart

66 Dad was a fly fishermen and bought the


holiday shack when I was two, so I've been coming for the past 50 years. As kids we just loved coming up here and now my kids love it.

66 What you've got here is one of the most

isolated towns in Victoria... you're looking at about an hour's drive on gravel roads in any direction to reach civilisation. We get a white main street at least once a year.

"We attract a bit of attention from the media because of our remoteness and unique lifestyle, but we're almost forgotten by the government. However, most serious four wheel drivers know the place... it's not unusual to get 20–30 4WDs parked outside the pub before heading off into the bush to do the tracks.

"There are little walks around the towns, plus lots of bush walks around the old gold diggings. There's still a lot of gold not recovered in the mines... it's a matter of the quality, the world price and the cost of getting it out. The mystique is still there and a new gold discovery would put the town back on the map.

"Most visitors come because they love the bush.

We attract them by word of mouth, sometimes people who haven't been back here for 40 or more years."

66 Most people don't realise Jamieson is here

because of gold - from here to Woods Point, over to Aberfeldy and down into Walhalla. They associate Bendigo and Ballarat with gold, but don't know that this area had the state's second richest gold mine.

"This was the end of the line, a staging point. From here into the valleys it was packhorse country, because the valleys are very narrow and the mountains so steep.

There's still plenty of gold up there.

"Quite a few come to fish and some say they want to have a really good look around, but they often just sit in an armchair in front of the fire and don't move, except for a walk around the river. In the hot weather we suggest they just sit at any of the spots up the river towards Kevington with a bottle and a couple of glasses. "




